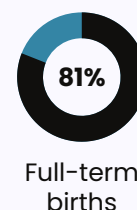
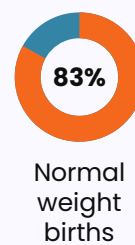
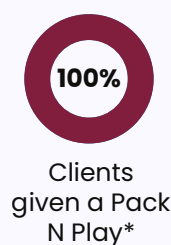
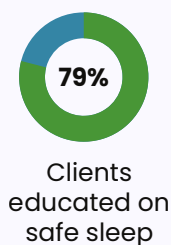
A Note from our Director

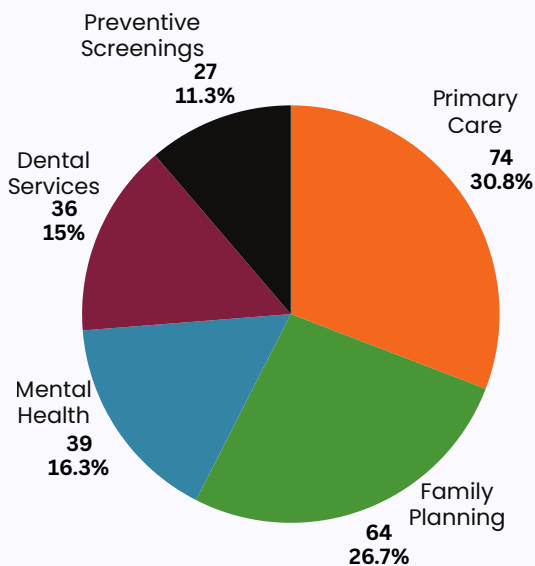
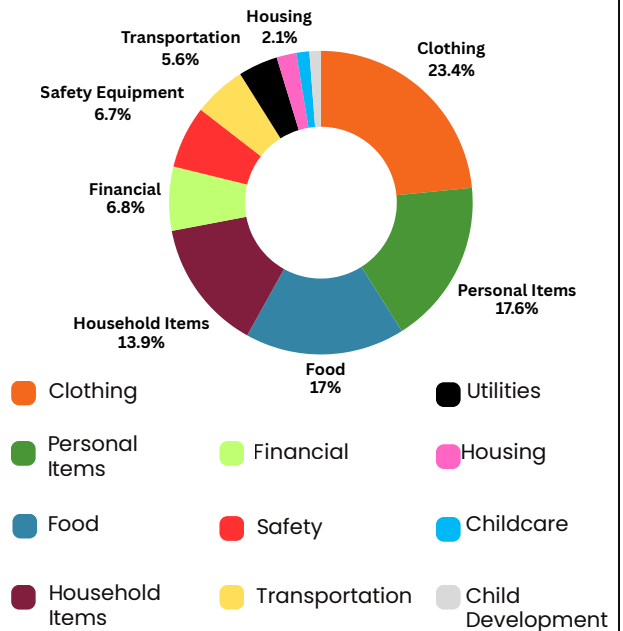
Pregnancy Highlights

Pediatric Insights

Access Health served 242 pediatric clients in 2024, 200 of whom were between 0 and 8 years old.

One in four children experiences or witnesses trauma, impacting their health and development. Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) are connected to issues in brain development, immune function, and emotional regulation, leading to difficulties in social, emotional, and academic areas, and increasing long-term health risks. To help mitigate these long-term health risks, Access Health addresses these challenges by using Ready Rosie, a research-based parenting curriculum for families with children aged 0–6, offering videos and insights to help parents nurture early literacy skills.

Our Role in the HUB Pathway Model

As a Community Health Worker (CHW) program, we support clients by documenting and delivering services through the Hub Pathways Model. In Stark County, this model is led by the Stark County Community Action Agency Hub, with our program serving as a designated Care Coordination Agency (CCA). The Hub Pathways Model offers a structured, coordinated approach that connects individuals to the services they need through defined "pathways."

CHWs work closely with clients to identify needs, set personal goals, and follow through with care. This approach enhances outcomes by tracking progress, reducing service duplication, and promoting whole-person, community-centered care.
